



Dear Parents and Carers,

This term started with the departure of Year 6 as they headed off to the Isle of Wight. Every Year a team of dedicated staff take Year 6 on a week's residential packed with activities and a few hours of sleep. An excellent time was had by all. A huge thank you to all of the staff involved in making this memorable experience so special; for their time, care and commitment. Thank you to all of the Year 6 children for being excellent school ambassadors.

Since returning they have been busy preparing for end of year activities and the next part of their school journey —Secondary school. Each year I tell the Year 6 leavers that we learn so much from them and thank them for their gift of helping us to be better teachers, better carers and better educators for all of the children who come after them. We are going to take another look at colour options with a larger focus group of parents (the class representatives) and allow for a two year transition.

I will arrange a meeting with class representatives before the end of this term to look at a full range of uniform options in the current and proposed colours. Once the decision on the colour has been made we will follow best practise regarding cost and quality to source our supplier. As you can appreciate this review of colour has had an impact on the timescale for introducing the new uniform which will now be September 2018. I will continue to keep you updated.

We have had another busy and exciting month including the Fun Run - the children had a great time, thank you to all involved in the preparations and on the day. As you will see from the dates there are lots more exciting events before the end of this year which I look forward to seeing you at.

Future funding will be different...

More to do on fair funding

Where are we on funding now post-election? This is not clear. Not least because we have a hung parliament. The Conservative manifesto included a change in their position so that no school would lose money (ie actual cash totals) following changes to the funding formula. This is welcome but independent analysts say this represents a 2.8% real-terms cut in per-pupil funding between 2016-2022. And we don't know yet whether this will be in the Queen's speech or how it might be changed.

So lots of uncertainty and lots still to do. Please support the efforts of the parents in the school who are taking the lead on fair funding for St Michael's. Thank you.

Fundraising Working Group up and running!

This week sees the first meeting of the Fundraising Working Group. Made up of four St Michael's parents and two governors, this group will be thinking how to raise significant sums for our longer-term capital works.

You may recall me asking for volunteers from the parent body for this. Well I am delighted to say four have stepped up and are joining the group: Helen Ram (Costello), Eva Axelsson Lewis, Abby Samuel and Robert Bahns. They are joined by two governors: assistant head Fran Sorapure and Mark Dailey who will chair the group.

Our four funding pots

Just a quick reminder on the sources of St Michael's funds. It's complicated I know!

1. **Our 'delegated budget' from Haringey.** This is the vast majority of our roughly £2 million annual budget and almost all of it goes on salaries (in keeping with other schools).
2. **SMSA funds.** The parents' body runs great social events that bring us together as a community and raise money too. This is about £40,000 a year. It pays for 'nice to haves' that enhance the children's day-to-day experience of school, for example the generous funding over three years of 108 iPads.
3. **Governors' Fund.** This raises money from parents through your regular donations (thank you!) and rental agreements. It pays for small-medium improvement projects such as the £75,000 needed to convert the old flat into music and intervention spaces.
4. **Fundraising Working Group.** This new group of parents and governors will raise significant funds for larger, longer-term improvement projects such as refurbishing all the classrooms on a rolling basis.

Last thing – please vote 'yes' on 6 July!

'Not another one!' as Brenda from Bristol said at the start of the general election campaign. Oh yes! On 6 July if you live in Highgate you have another vote to make! That's because there has to be a referendum on the Highgate neighbourhood plan. This has been put together by local people and – if you vote yes! – will help ensure Highgate develops in a way that considers our views. Please do vote and do vote yes!
