## Our children will:

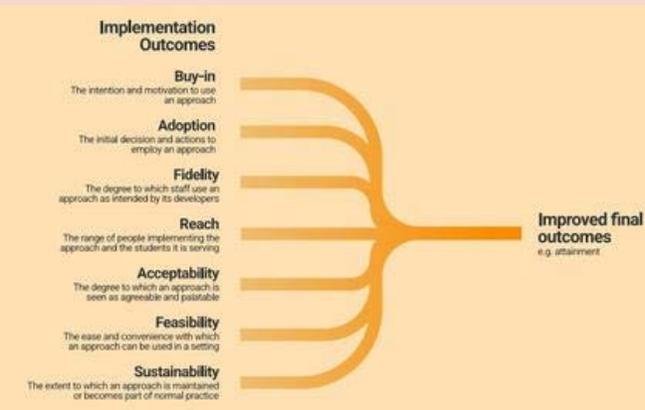

<p>- Identify pupil needs and their root causes - Understand current practices and what influences them This is based on current data and monitoring information.</p>	<p>Specified strategies allow leaders to:</p> <p>Monitor fidelity - To assess whether an approach is being used as intended you need to know what you are looking for. The core components inform how to monitor implementation fidelity Enable intelligent adaptations - Building a shared understanding of the core components allows staff to agree what can and can't be adapted, which can improve implementation. When schools are developing their own approaches, there are limits to how accurately the core components can be specified.</p> <p>Implementation leaders should, therefore, keep reviewing the core components</p>	<p>-</p> <p>A range of strategies shaped by the details of the problem. The process of selecting and tailoring strategies continues throughout implementation as barriers and success emerge.</p>	 <p><b>Implementation Outcomes</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><b>Buy-in</b> The intention and motivation to use an approach</li> <li><b>Adoption</b> The initial decision and actions to employ an approach</li> <li><b>Fidelity</b> The degree to which staff use an approach as intended by its developers</li> <li><b>Reach</b> The range of people implementing the approach and the students it is serving</li> <li><b>Acceptability</b> The degree to which an approach is seen as agreeable and palatable</li> <li><b>Feasibility</b> The ease and convenience with which an approach can be used in a setting</li> <li><b>Sustainability</b> The extent to which an approach is maintained or becomes part of normal practice</li> </ul> <p><b>Improved final outcomes</b> e.g. attainment</p>	<p>It is likely that these final outcomes will include pupil-level outcomes such as attainment and attendance as well as information about the quality of teaching.</p>

## 2024-2028 Priorities

- ❖ To refine the teaching of writing to improve outcomes across the NLC (specifically for boys and disadvantaged learners)
- ❖ To become a Smartphone-Free Childhood Community – supporting parents and carers to raise their children with positive self-confidence, good mental health, healthy, equitable relationships and friendships
- ❖ To enhance provision for children with additional needs (children with EHCPs, children on SEN support and those with additional needs) across our community.
- ❖ To work collaboratively to find ways to reduce the financial impact on resources across the NLC.
